Zelensky Is Open to 'Compromise' On Russia's 4 Demands

Summary:

Russia has the following demands: a) Want Ukraine to cease fire and military action; b) They want that Ukraine should change its constitution; c) Acknowledge Crimea as a part of Russia; d) Accept the regions of Donetsk and Lugansk as separate states. Ukraine's president, Volodymyr Zelensky mentioned that they are no longer pushing to be a part of NATO. He thinks that NATO is not ready to take Ukraine and he will not be begging for the membership. He said that he is indeed "open to a conversation" but will not agree to every condition and terms that Russia has put forward. He also claimed that he is willing to listen and negotiate on the territories that have been occupied and unrecognised republics. Russian demand is to not only wants Crimea to officially become a part of Russia but also want Ukraine to separate itself from the Donbas region. Zelensky pointed out that the above condition is not as simple as it sounds because as president, he must consider how people in that region think; including the ones who want to be a part of Ukraine. Ukraine can't agree to the condition of ceasing the military action as it is the only thing that has kept them alive in the war. After their 3rd round of talks, the parties agreed to open and operate humanitarian corridors normally.

Facts and Figures:

- Both the countries have agreed to operate humanitarian corridors from March 14.

Opinion:

Ukraine's president, Volodymyr Zelensky is no longer wanting to be a part of NATO as he thinks that NATO is not welcoming them. He is also mentioned that he is wanting to talk and negotiate with Russia. Zelensky is willing to talk about Crimea and the separatist area but is adamant that they will not cease their military actions. Both the countries have had 3 rounds of talks and they do not seem to find a meeting point. Nevertheless, both the parties are open for negotiations and talks.
